#### Official Information Act Request - Mental Health & Addictions Waitlist

On 30 January 2020, under section 12 of the Official Information Act, you requested the following information from Whanganui District Health Board (WDHB):

Under the Official Information Act (1982) I would like to request the following information about addiction services and subsequent wait times to access them.

- Can you please provide a list of the different types of addiction services people can access through the public health system?
- How many rehab and detox beds are currently available through the public health system for people addicted to drugs and alcohol?
- How many people were put on a waitlist to access detox and rehab addiction services each year over the past four years (2016 - 2019).
- Can each year please be broken down into months ie the number of people each month put on a waitlist?
- Can the waitlisted people please be broken down into category ie what service it was that they were wanting to access, and were subsequently waitlisted for?
- Can you please categorise these waitlisted people into wait-times. ie those who had to wait 5 weeks, 6 weeks, 7 weeks and so on....

### Whanganui District Health Board response:

### Question 1: Can you please provide a list of different types of addiction services people can access through the public health system?

A list of different types of addiction services people can access through the public health system includes, and is not limited to; counselling services, face to face appointments with an allocated key worker (who offer a variety of talk therapies), relapse prevention and support groups, support worker involvement, opioid substitution treatment (OST), planned managed withdrawal services, (provided within a variety of settings), appointments with specialist addiction's Doctor, referral to medically

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managed inpatient withdrawal services , referrals to Iwi Services and cultural support services, referral to day program, referral to residential to rehabilitation, Information and referrals to addiction focused community-based groups and NGO's , including family support services.

# Question 2: How many rehab and detox beds are currently available through the public health system for people addicted to drugs and alcohol?

The Wanganui District Health Board has access to 3 detox beds and have a referral process that provides access to regional rehabilitation beds in partnership with the Salvation Army service who are managed by Capital and Coast DHB

## Question 3: How many people were put on a wait list to access detox and rehab addiction services each year over the past 4 years (2016–2019)










The wait times for by age and ethnicity for 2019 are explained in the following graphs
