Official Information Act Request – Colonoscopy Services

On 7 September 2020, under section 12 of the Official Information Act, you requested the following information from Whanganui District Health Board (WDHB):

- How many patients were on the waiting list for colonoscopies at the end of each month from August 2018 to August 2020?
- What was the average wait time for urgent or category A colonoscopies at the end of each month from August 2018 to August 2020?
- What was the average wait time for non-urgent or category B colonoscopies at the end of each month from August 2018 to August 2020?
- What was the average wait time for surveillance or routine colonoscopies at the end of each month from August 2018 to August 2020?
- What was the ratio between colonoscopies performed for non-urgent patients, versus patients referred through the National Bowel Screening Programme at the end of each month from August 2018 to August 2020? (If the screening programme has been rolled out in your DHB area).
- How many of your patients have recovered from colorectal cancer, versus those that died from the disease between August 2019 and August 2020?
- How many colonoscopies lead to a confirmed diagnosis of colorectal cancer each month from August 2018 to August 2020?
- How many categories does your DHB divide your waiting list into? What are the criteria for each category?
- How many people are presently on the colonoscopy waiting list for each of these categories?
- How long is the average waiting time for each category?

- How many categories does your DHB divide your waiting list into? What are the criteria for each category?
 - 1. **Urgent** (criteria as per attached "Referral Criteria for Direct Access Outpatient Colonoscopy or Computed Tomography Colonography" document, MOH, 2019)
 - a. Known or suspected CRC (on imaging, or palpable, or visible on rectal examination), for pre-operative procedure to rule out synchronous pathology
 - b. Unexplained rectal bleeding (benign anal causes treated or excluded) with iron deficiency anaemia (haemoglobin below the local reference range)
 - c. Altered bowel habit (looser and/or more frequent) > six weeks duration plus unexplained rectal bleeding (benign anal causes treated or excluded) aged ≥50 years
 - 2. **Non-urgent** (criteria as per attached "Referral Criteria for Direct Access Outpatient Colonoscopy or Computed Tomography Colonography" document, MOH, 2019)
 - a. Altered bowel habit (looser and/or more frequent) > six weeks' duration, aged ≥50 years
 - Altered bowel habit (looser and/or more frequent) > six weeks' duration plus unexplained rectal bleeding (benign anal causes treated or excluded), aged 40–50 years
 - c. Unexplained rectal bleeding (benign anal causes treated or excluded) aged ≥50 years
 - d. Unexplained iron deficiency anaemia (haemoglobin below local reference range) (see Comments for Services section items 1 and 2)
 - e. New Zealand Guidelines Group (NZGG) Category 2 family history plus one or more of altered bowel habit (looser and/or more frequent) > six weeks' duration plus unexplained rectal bleeding (benign and anal causes treated or excluded), aged ≥40 years
 - f. NZGG Category 3 family history plus one or more of altered bowel habit (looser and/or more frequent) > six weeks' duration plus unexplained rectal bleeding (benign and anal causes treated or excluded), aged ≥25 years
 - g. Suspected/assessment inflammatory bowel disease (consider FSA)
 - h. Imaging reveals polyp >5 mm
 - 3. **Surveillance** (criteria as per "Guidance on Surveillance for people at increased risk of colorectal cancer" document, New Zealand Guidelines Group, 2011)
 - a. Refer to document identified above

The 3 colonoscopy wait time target indicators are as follows:

- 1) 90% of people accepted for urgent diagnostic colonoscopy receive their procedure (or are still waiting within the required timeframe) in 14 calendar days or less.
- 2) 70% of people accepted for non-urgent diagnostic colonoscopy receive their procedure (or are still waiting within the required timeframe) in 42 calendar days or less.
- 3) 70% of people accepted for surveillance colonoscopy receive their procedure (or are still waiting within the required timeframe) in 84 calendar days of less of the planned date.
